INTERNATIONAL SECURITY

Committee primer

The Security Council sits at the centre of the United Nations response to threats against international peace. Its members must weigh urgency against sovereignty, build coalitions, and decide what the international community is prepared to enforce.

Delegates should arrive ready to interpret the UN Charter, negotiate precise language, and respond when the facts change faster than a draft resolution can be written.

Two topics will shape the room.

The Secretariat has not yet supplied the official topic wording. These spaces are intentionally marked pending so delegates are not asked to prepare from invented or outdated information.

Start with transferable preparation

- Understand the committee mandate, powers, and limits.
- Build a short timeline of events and identify the decisions that changed the situation.
- Map the interests, leverage, and constraints of the role you represent.
- Separate verified facts from assumptions, claims, and crisis updates.
- Practice writing specific operative actions that name who acts, what they do, and how it is carried out.

Research carefully. Speak with purpose.

A prepared delegate does more than collect facts. Use this checklist to turn research into decisions the room can understand and act on.

Before the conference

- Read the final guide release and note both official topic titles.
- Review your role brief and prepare a one-minute opening position.
- Bring a short source list and organize notes so evidence is easy to retrieve.
- Draft two or three actions your role could support, then identify likely partners.

Questions to keep asking

- What outcome does my role actually need?
- Which part of this proposal is enforceable, funded, and within our mandate?
- What new information would cause me to change course?
- Who has not been heard, and what risk are we overlooking?
